

## KS3 4B Fair chocolate

### Planning/adapting

This lesson involves finding out about the Day Chocolate Company and Divine Chocolate and other available Fairtrade products.

#### Print/copy:

- *Printout 4B Fairtrade chocolate and Comic Relief (one per student)*

### Starter (10 mins)

Using the information in the 'Teacher info' section below, test that your students have understood the concept of Fairtrade.

### Main activity (30 mins)

Distribute *Printout 4B1* to help your students find out about the Day Chocolate Company and Divine Chocolate. Ask them to find answers to the following:

Who are they and what do they do?

How can you tell the difference between a fairly traded product and a non-fairly traded one?

What are the benefits of trading with the Day Chocolate Company? (Farmers are shareholders and therefore receive bonuses, guaranteed prices, fair treatment, community development projects etc.)

Why does Comic Relief support Dubble, a fairly traded chocolate bar?

**Plenary (10 mins)**

For Fairtrade chocolate to be a success it needs to be stocked in all key supermarkets and shops. Ask students to think of as many Fairtrade products as they can and where they are available. They may have heard of these:

Fairtrade products are available in supermarkets, wholefood and one world shops, and from Oxfam and Traidcraft.
